When cancer becomes your world, The Goodtimes Project creates caring spaces for local families to connect and kids to be kids, through camps, events, and programs. We serve families throughout Western Washington and Alaska with a goal of providing cost-free programming to help them reconnect with a world beyond their diagnosis.

Our vision is that all families affected by childhood cancer will experience a community of hope, love, and joy.

Our signature events and programs are integral to bringing this vision to life:

- Annual Goodtimes Gala: our largest fundraiser, in its 15th year
- **Drive-a-Thon**: a unique, race car inspired fundraiser and family event
- Camp Goodtimes: the resident camp of our dreams for ages 7–17, in its 35th year
- Kayak Adventure Camp: an ocean and camping adventure for survivors ages 18–25

What does a life well-lived look like for families living with a childhood cancer diagnosis? In addition to great medical care, it means infusing hope, joy, and love back into their lives. At The Goodtimes Project, this is central to our mission! HOPE can look like a glance between two campers at the beach on Vashon Island at Camp Goodtimes. JOY can look like the ear-to-ear smile a kayak camper shares with their fellow kayakers after finishing that first intense channel crossing. And, LOVE can look like an entire room of devoted supporters raising their bid cards and giving generously at the Goodtimes Gala!

This past year, our community was honored to witness countless examples of HOPE, JOY, and LOVE at our camps, programs, and events. Not only did *35 new* families attend a camp or program for the first time, but we grew our ability to serve them and others through the addition of *eight new* camps and programs! We see our vision of creating caring spaces for all families affected by childhood cancer becoming more of a reality every day.

To achieve our vision, we rely on supporters like you. Each year, I am overwhelmed by the generosity and passion of the Goodtimes community. More than 200 selfless volunteers commit to giving their time and talent, as well as hundreds of amazing donors and advocates whose loyalty is unparalleled. Haley, age 10, relapsed in 2017 and required a bone marrow transplant (BMT). She was devastated that she'd have to miss camp. Haley did two rounds of chemo and was hospitalized while her counts were recovering. The doctor said if she was strong enough with good blood counts she might be able to go. Well, she was discharged on Thursday and attended camp on Sunday! It was a tough decision to let her go but after consulting with the doctors we figured this was something that she needed to do—she needed to have fun and be a kid before going through a BMT. I truly believe her being able to attend Camp Goodtimes before transplant helped her relax and forget about cancer for that week. It made her stronger.

I was diagnosed with Burkitt's Lymphoma at age two, and five years later I became, what is called a camp lifer; meaning I started attending at age 7 (the youngest age you can attend Camp Goodtimes) and came back every summer until aging out at 17. After aging out of Camp Goodtimes, I transitioned to attending Kayak Adventure Camp—a week-long kayak camping trip for young adult cancer survivors in the San Juan Islands. Here I took on the Kayak Camp name Mr. Kelp, and was welcomed into a community of others who had gone through similar struggles of battling and recovering from cancer. In my six years attending Kayak Camp, I have made more than a few lasting memories; hiking around Jones Island, almost getting run down by a frightened deer, sleeping beneath the stars in hammocks, and building new relationships around a shared interest.

Fundraising

Donations make it possible for us to do our thing—going beyond what medical treatment can provide and encouraging patients, survivors, siblings, and families to live their best lives. Our community of donors share our mission and helped us reach our year-over-year fundraising goals: Goodtimes Gala up 39.3%, Drive-a-Thon up 7.1%, and Grants up 84%.

Programming

2018 was a year of fantastic growth for programming. We hired a full-time Program Manager to collaborate with the Camp Director and achieved our goal of creating year-round opportunities for families. That investment allowed us to more than double the number of camps, programs, and events we were able to provide—jumping from 6 in 2017 to 14 in 2018. We're both planful and opportunistic about the new adventures that we take on, but each new experience remains true to our core by providing hope, joy, and love to its participants.

Volunteering

As a staff of three it would be impossible to successfully plan, staff, and execute this year's (and every year's) fundraising and programming events. We have built and continue to grow a supportive community of volunteers that are dedicated to fulfilling our mission and who help the kids, young adults, and families we serve live their best lives. Volunteering ranges from single-day support, to committees spanning multiple months, to nine-day staff at Camp Goodtimes, and everything in between. Our daughter Madeline was diagnosed with a malignant peripheral nerve sheath tumor, also known as Neurosarcoma, in 2012 at age 3 and relapsed three years later when she was 6. She's been to camp three times, and this year her younger sister, Annabelle, was able to join her thanks to a new program, Mini Camp, for kids 5-7 years old. Annabelle and the other mini campers traveled to Camp Goodtimes for a day to participate in camp activities and see what it would be like to go for a full week in the future. She ate lunch with all the campers attending Camp Goodtimes, where she got to see her older sister Madeline. Annabelle's only complaints were that she didn't get to see her sister enough and she wanted to stay longer!

Our son, Noah, age 11, was diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukemia (AML) at 8, and after a successful bone marrow transplant he was able to attend Camp Goodtimes with our daughter, Lydia, who had attended the previous year. Lydia also attended the inaugural session of Sibling Ski Camp in March, facing her fears of giving up control while trying her hand at a new outdoor activity. We chose to send her to Ski Camp because it's a place where she wouldn't need to worry about sugar coating the truth about her journey as a cancer sibling—the other kids get it. Although she wasn't a huge fan of skiing itself, Lydia enjoyed being able to have a weekend among kids who understand what she's been through. She left feeling empowered after conquering a new experience, and with strengthened bonds to fellow campers and staff.




